ADMISSIONS

Requirements

Graduation from secondary school required; GED accepted. General college-preparatory program required. 4 units of English, 4 units of mathematics, 3 units of lab science, 2 units of foreign language, 1 unit of social studies, 1 unit of history, and 1 unit of career/technical education or fine arts required. Minimum composite ACT score of 22 (combined SAT Reasoning score of 1120), rank in top quarter of secondary school class, or minimum 3.0 GPA required of in-state applicants; minimum composite ACT score of 24 (combined SAT Reasoning score of 1180), rank in top quarter of secondary school class, or minimum 3.0 GPA required of out-of-state applicants. Audition required of music program applicants. School is test-optional. SAT Reasoning or ACT required of some applicants. SAT Subject required of some applicants. Campus visit recommended. Admissions interview required of some applicants. Off-campus interviews not available. Admission may be deferred up to two years. Application fee \$50 (\$70 for out-of-state, \$85 for international applicants), may be waived in cases of financial need; nonrefundable.

Basis for Candidate Selection

Academic: Class rank and standardized test scores very important.
 Secondary school record important.
 Non-academic: State residence considered.

Admissions Procedure

Normal sequence: Suggest filing application by February 1. Common application form accepted. Notification of admission is sent on a rolling basis beginning September 1. Reply is required by May 1 or within two weeks if notified thereafter. Freshmen may enter in terms other than fall. Admissions process is need-blind.

Transfers: Transfer students are accepted. In fall 2018, 5,927 transfer applications were received, 4,958 were accepted. Application deadline is rolling for fall, spring, and summer. Minimum 24 semester hours required to apply as a transfer. College transcript required; standardized test scores recommended. Minimum 2.0 college GPA required; applicants with fewer than 24 transferable semester hours must have minimum 2.5 GPA and meet freshman aptitude requirements. Lowest course grade accepted is "C." Maximum number of transferable semester hours is 64 from two-year schools; 90 from four-year schools. At least 30 semester hours must be completed at the school to earn a bachelor's degree.

International Students: 4,505 degree-seeking undergraduate students enrolled, 104 countries represented. Application deadline is May 1 for fall; November 1 for spring; February 1 for summer.

Learning Disabled Students: Support services available. Lowest grade average accepted is "C." Lighter course load and additional time to complete degree permitted. Program/services serve 290 identified students.

Placement Options: Credit may be granted for DANTES exams and International Baccalaureate. Placement may be granted for challenge exams. Credit and placement may be granted for CLEP general exams and CLEP subject exams.

Freshman Class Profile

For fall 2018, 85% of 26,869 applicants were offered admission. 39% of those accepted matriculated.

Secondary school class rank of freshmen (fall 2018): 33% in the top tenth, 62% in the top quarter, 89% in the top half, 11% in the bottom half, 2% in the bottom quarter.

67% of freshmen submitted class rank.

Average secondary school GPA of freshmen (fall 2018): 3.54.

60% of accepted applicants submitted SAT Reasoning; 58% submitted ACT.

Expenses

Tuition (2018-19): \$10,104 per year (state residents), \$27,618 (out-of-state), \$29,834 (international). Room: \$7,600. Board: \$5,048. Required fees: \$718. Books/misc. expenses (school's estimate): \$4,578. (Tuition and room and board figures are estimated.)

Financial Aid

Needs analysis based on federal methodology. FAFSA: Priority filing date is January 1. Notification of awards begins March 1. In 2017, the average aid package of full-time undergraduates with financial need was \$15,800; \$17,398 for full-time freshmen. School participates in Federal Work-Study Program. 45% of 2017 graduates incurred an average debt of \$23,731. Of full-time undergraduates receiving need-based financial aid, an average of 62% of need was met.

Scholarships and Grants

Need-based Federal Pell, SEOG, state, college/university, private, and UNCF scholarships/grants. Non-need-based state, academic merit, creative arts/performance, special achievements/activities, and athletic scholarships/grants. On average, 245 non-need-based athletic scholarships are awarded with an average amount of \$22,907. In 2017, \$229,063,258 in need-based scholarships/grants and \$156,215,227 in non-need-based scholarships/grants was awarded.

Loans

Academic Experience

88% of freshmen return for their sophomore year. Average GPA of freshmen after first year is 3.1 on a 4.0 scale. 69% of freshmen graduate within six years. The most popular majors among recent graduates were business/management/marketing, biology/biological sciences, and computer science.

GENERAL

Housing

Regulations and Policies

Alcohol prohibited on campus. Class attendance policies set by individual instructors. Hazing, smoking, and smokeless tobacco prohibited. All students may have cars on campus.

Environment/Transportation

661-acre campus in Tempe (population: 185,038). Public transportation serves campus.

Calendar

Semester system; classes begin in mid-August and mid-January. Three summer sessions, one of eight weeks and two of six weeks each. Orientation for new students held between March and August.
